### **ARTIST STATEMENT**

Think of this as your artistic manifesto. It's a concise narrative that explains the inspiration, intention, and themes behind your work.

It is your opportunity to connect with viewers on a deeper level, inviting them into your creative world. It's all about the WHY behind your art.

Written in the 1st person as if you are speaking directly to the reader.

My practice playfully lands in the childlike wonder of this world. Infusing the energy of curiosity and discovery back through fine art.

Using a painting process that is physical and unconventional, the art emerges with character. Working in acrylic and mixed media. With hardware-store brushes. Broken sticks. Rags. And hands. That move paint. Add layers. Pulls back layers. Drips. Scrapes. Wipes. And pulls the paint across the surface.



I play. I toy with abstraction, producing work that cannot always be categorized as one thing or another, unless, of course, the classification is the unexpected.

My art relays a personal conversation about the value of awe and play. The art titles are poetic and descriptive, reflective of the process of exploration. The goal is to start an internal dialogue within one person, or an external dialogue within a greater community. Providing enough visual inspiration and written dialogue to point in a direction, then to let the viewer veer off course.... to be lost, then found.

This is playing big. It means listening less to conventions and more to the voices of exploration that whisper... come down this path, open your heart, mind, and eyes... breath in wonder... play.



### **BIOGRAPHY**

Your biography is your personal story as an artist. It provides insight into your background, education, artistic journey, and major accomplishments.

Unlike an artist statement, which focuses on your artistic process and philosophy, your biography gives a broader picture of who you are as a person and how your experiences have shaped your art.

It is written in the 3rd person and as if someone is summarizing your artistic life.

Through large-scale abstract painting, Beverly's art playfully dances with color and movement. Her painting process is physical, using hardware-store brushes, broken sticks, rags, and hands to drip, scrape, wipe, and pull paint across surfaces. She works in acrylic, oil, soft wax, and with paper.

Growing up in rural Nebraska, Beverly often escaped into the landscape -- happily lost for hours in the open prairie that inspires her work.

Beverly began painting in Santa Fe in 2018. To give others that experience, she opened Santa Fe Artist Getaway the next year moving her art practice and artsbased teaching from Omaha to Santa Fe.

Her creativity coaching helps artists discover their potential. She leads workshops in abstract expressionism encouraging artists to paint big, free, and expressive. She also leads arts-based team-building workshops for non-artists.

Beverly paints and teaches in Santa Fe.

Know who you are and why you create.

Do a deep dive to uncover your why.

Journal & ask yourself questions to gain clarity.



Format your Artist Statement

- I am...
- I do...
- Why I do...
- How I connect/related to you (the viewer)

Feel free to mix up the order.

<u>3</u> DO

Begin with the most interesting or the most important thing first.

The first word in the very first sentence must grab attention & ignite curiosity.



- Be positive
- Be bold
- Be bright
- Be brief



Tell stories....

- About you
- This piece of art
- How the art was created
- Use humor
- Be vulnerable
- Go deeper



Anticipate questions.

From the general public and from art people.

Write so they understand.



#### DO

Edit ruthlessly for clarity & simplicity.

Cut jargon.

Cut wordiness.

Keep only the very best stuff.

Get a second set of eyes on your copy – someone good in English, journalism, or writing.



#### **DON'T**

Use cliché' phrases, like...

"Pushing the boundaries..."

"Exploring the unknown..."

Tell exactly what you mean by "exploring the unknown." Be original & specific to your practice.

### DON'T

State the obvious.

Go deeper.

This is your opportunity to share!
For example, don't begin with
"As a kid I loved to draw."
Didn't every artist, every kid?

### DON'T

- Be boring
- Be literal
- Be obvious
- Be wordy
- Be long-winded
